We are a small club having a huge impact on our Central Coast Community. A concern I have is 'duty of care' for our members. Over a dinner at Julie's home, I asked our members why they were in Rotary.



The Annual Changeover Dinner of the Rotary Cub of The Entrance was held at Mingara on Tuesday 18th June 2024. This was a fun evening of celebration of a successful year just past, and thirty people attended, including DG Christine Owen, Mark Cooper and his wife Judy, and our very own member Emma McBride MP. We also thank Jane Mote and Lillias Bovell of Rotary Brisbane Water for their attendance.

MC for the night was PDG Peter Ward, DG Christine gave the Toast to Rotary International, and the Objects of Rotary were presented by Louise Paul.



Special donations were presented to Central Coast Kids in Need, Yarran Early Intervention Services and The Benevolent Society by Treasurer Julie Glover. Julie told those present that between year end giving and donations made throughout the year, the club has distributed over \$72,000 to our local community and projects overseas.



CC Kids in Need surprised the club by making their own presentation to us! Between our annual donations and the money returned to them for sales of tickets in our Community Raffle, over the last four years the club has given them over \$18,000 – which does not include that share of profits made from Bunnings BBQs where we give them a pro rata amount for the hours their volunteers have supported us selling

sausage sandwiches. The award was presented to Clive Denmark, and makes Rotary The Entrance an official

Community Ambassador of Central Coast Kids in Need.













The Yarran perpetual trophy for Social Justice was presented to Julie Glover by Naomi Martin from Yarran Early Intervention Services, and the Zammit Community Service Award was presented to PDG Peter Ward by President Gordon.

The most special award of the evening was the presentation of a Paul Harris Fellowship to Don Cannings. Don is well known in the community as the organiser of the Spin and Win, held twice monthly in Bateau Bay Square, and our club liaison person with the Health on The Streets team run by Coast and Country Primary Care. Don has been

Vocational Director over the past few years, during which time we have held two Community and Vocational Awards Nights in conjunction with Erina Rotary Club, and was also one of the driving forces behind the popular Bunny Hunt. Also a regular at Bunnings BBQs and the Christmas Trees – you just have to turn around at anything and you will bump into Don. A most well deserved award Don!

President Gordon Crawford is staying on as President for the coming year, but nevertheless partner Sue Kemp was presented with flowers for giving him her support over the past year. No doubt she'll be looking for something more for backing up two years in a row!

Gordon spoke of most of the projects we have had over the last twelve months, but made special mention of the Beanie project, as it is often overlooked because there is no monetary value associated to this which prompts a mention. Since the pandemic, when we heard from Shoebox Revolution over a zoom meeting, when it was cold and they were very short of beanies to distribute to the homeless, Gordon and Sue realised that there were portentially many knitters locked down in their village. They took up a collection for unused wool, found a pattern and



encouraged people to knit beanies. The ladies were happy to have something to do which was useful, and Shoebox Revolution was delighted to have some seriously warm beanies to hand out. This project continues to this day, and over 1000 beanies have been knitted by the ladies of Tarragul Glen for the homeless.

Gordon then introduced his new Board for 2024-25, and presented them with their theme pins.

Better food today A better world tomorrow

The young woman who submitted the tech support message below (about her relationship with her husband) presumably did it as a joke. Then she got a reply that was way too good to keep to herself. The tech support people's love advice was hilarious.

The query:

Dear Tech Support,

"Last year I upgraded from Boyfriend 5.0 to Husband 1.0 and noticed a distinct slowdown in overall system performance, particularly in the flower and jewelry applications, which operated flawlessly under Boyfriend 5.0.

In addition, Husband 1.0 uninstalled many other valuable programs, such as Romance 9.5 and Personal Attention 6.5, and then installed undesirable programs such as NBA 5.0, NFL 3.0, and Golf Clubs 4.1. First, keep in mind, Boyfriend 5.0 is an Entertainment Package, while Husband 1.0 is an Operating System. Please enter the command: I thought you loved me.html and try to download Tears 6.2. Do not forget to install the Guilt 3.0 update. If that application works as designed, Husband 1.0 should then automatically run the applications Jewelry 2.0 and Flowers 3.5.
